Gloria Auermiller passed away after a courageous battle with cancer. A lifelong Shorewood resident and well known interior decorator for 50 years, Gloria attended the Layton School of Art.

George Donovan was a member of the Milwaukee County Park Commission, Milwaukee County Zoo board, was a mason and Shriner, and a Navy veteran.

On June 14th **Carolyn Sheets Brokway** wrote “I hate to be writing about bad news but this past year has been a real “bummer” for me. Last July my blood tests were showing that my colon cancer was showing up again (3rd time). So I did chemotherapy from August till late November. In that period my husband Dave died in September. He had the beginnings of Alzheimer’s and developed pneumonia which took him. We had just celebrated our 58th wedding anniversary August 31.

“Then in in late December my youngest

daughter who lives here in Tuscon was diagnosed with brain and lung cancer! She has had surgery and good treatment and is doing ok.

“In February I went through 5½ weeks of daily radiation treatments for my cancer then May 31st had surgery to eliminate the last shriveled up piece of cancer tissue! My oldest daughter from Muncie came out and stayed with me during that time.

“I am home now and trying to get my strength back and doing quite well. I am hoping to get to Norther Michigan next month for an extended stay at Lake Leelenau. Things are looking up!

In a chatty letter **Marilyn Thornberry Salmon** wrote “**Roy [Genskow], Helen [Genskow]** and I had lunch at a pretty nice restaurant--short order but lengthy menu--and we must have talked for an hour and a half.... I didn't learn much about how Helen was, however, as I don't think she is the kind of person who discusses her problems. Roy comes to Freedom Village every Monday to play Sheepshead.”

“I keep after both of my sons--I am like a shrew--did you have your yearly physical yet?--have you been to the dentist yet? Have you had your psa yet? Etc., etc., etc. Now, my younger son is getting after me. He's scared he's going to lose me.....

[My older son] “has a really nice wife and two lovely daughters.”

Marguerite Aylward Weaver writes “Meant to write much sooner, but life keeps getting in the way. Hope you and your charming wife are in the best of health and enjoying life to the utmost. Speaking of enjoying, I'm reading each of your newsletters with increased enjoyment, as the news of many old friends is growing with each issue. Please keep them coming. Perhaps I can contribute some information about me and mine...

“The spring was very busy with a daughter's wedding in April in Scottsdale, with a return home for cataract surgery in both eyes (the world is such a brighter and more colorful place now!), and then a trip back to Phoenix on the death of my brother-in-law. He was a prisoner during the war in Vietnam, spending five years in the Hanoi Hilton. He died the night that the John McCain book "Faith of our Fathers" was aired. A bit of sad irony

that, inasmuch as he was there with McCain and the others.

“I'm not really given to a great deal of traveling, but during the summer I'll be visiting my son John, who is a surgeon practicing in Gaylord, Michigan, and later I'll travel to Tampa, FL to spend some time with my daughter Ann, who has her Ph.D. in Animal Psychobiology, and who teaches, writes books and studies dolphins in and around Tampa Bay. Her latest book is "Good Natured Statistics," which neatly interweaves one of the subjects she teaches with her considerable knowledge of animal behavior. And after that, if earthquakes do not necessitate a change in plans, I'll be visiting my son Paul in California, where he is chief design engineer for a Santa Barbara plant that specializes in making aircraft generators. Between trips, I'll be spending a week in Boulder Junction, WI with daughter Mary, husband Lee and my three grandchildren.

“I'm feeling great, swim three times a week, and thank my lucky stars for a most delightful retirement.”

“I feel badly that I didn't acknowledge Mr. Mandel's effort at graduation and for not having thanked him on behalf of our '44 Classmates.”

Ralph Welton announced his move with a nice note posted July 11th that reads “The time has come when Ann and I have made the decision, with a lot of help from our children, to move back to the Chicago area. We have sold our home in Rogers Arkansas and will be moving on or about the 15th of August. I can tell you it was not an easy decision to make. Northwest Arkansas has a beauty and charm that is going to be tough to leave after 21 years. We will also be leaving a whole host of friends that we have developed over that period of time and they will be missed. But time moves on and it is now time to make a change and we hope to make some new friends plus the fact that we will be close to most of our family.”

Lois Rajski Schobert is slowly gaining her strength back and is about midway thru chemo, according to **Beverly Becker Koenen**. She goes on to say “**Pat Daase** and **Helen Snyder** and I are looking forward to playing cards with her again.”

Richard Scheife says that he is doing well in his Florida residence, currently brokering world-

Of course all this activity severely interrupted her physical therapy. Note that this was before hurricane Rita hit New Orleans with a second flooding; news of the impact of this on Beverly was unknown at the time this newsletter was printed. We certainly wish Beverly and her family well in recovering from this disaster. Based on our data base Beverly was the only one of our classmates put at risk by hurricanes Katrina and Rita.
